During mathematics lesson, students revised counting 1-20 and were able to match the quantity to the number symbols 1-20. Well done, children!













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












































For World Book Day, the students read a section from their favourite book. They also wrote and drew a picture about their favourite book.


To celebrate World Book Day, students brought their favourite books to school. They drew pictures of the cover and wrote short summaries to share about the book with their classmates.

Hawkin went through many difficulties and met cruel pirates. He went through harm and danger, learned about stories among the pirates, and mysterious mysteries waiting for him to discover.



Salt Precipitation

In this class practical, students made two soluble metal salts react to produce soluble salt and insoluble salt. They made ead nitrate solution and sodium chloride solution react to produce solid lead chloride, leaving sodium nitrate in solution.






Titration

In their chemistry lesson, students learned how to use titration data to figure out the concentration of an acid or a base. In this lesson students conducted a titration in order to determine the concentration of NaOH that is used to neutralise a known concentration and volume of hydrochloric acid acid.

It smells like musty, rotten and malodorous tofu.


It feels like a mental war with social anxiety being my archnemesis.

It seems like an inevitable, unwakeable dream.












Awkwardness







Pastoral Care Article How to Help Your Child to Identify and Regulate their Emotions?

Require: Patience (**) Your children are still learning these skills

Fact: Children's frontal cortex isn't fully developed, and that is the biological reason that causes children (especially toddler) to have difficulty in regulating their emotions.

6 Ways to Help your Children to Manage their Emotions:

- (1) Identify the Triggers: Make some time to talk to your children about issues that concern him/her.
- (2) Name the Feelings: Talk about emotions and feelings with kids, help them to identify their feelings through their behaviours (click to find the feeling words for kids)
- (3) Identify Feelings of Others: Play some emotions game with your children (you can find a lot of ideas online)
- (4) Praise behaviour that you want to see repeated, and let them practise.
- (5) Be their Model: Children learned their mood regulation skills via modeling.
- (6) Coping Strategies to Regulate Emotions: (a) Deep Breathing Exercises; (b) Drawing; (c) Writing a Diary; (d) Singing and Dancing; (e) Taking a Bath; (f) Blowing Bubbles; (g) Listening to Calm Music; (h) Practising positive self-talk
