



### **IPC- Fit for Life-Big Picture**











# Rafflesia YEAR 7 MATHEMATICS







Students carried out group task in which they did research on Malaysian traditional food (Makanan Tradisional di Malaysia). They presented their findings using slides.

**JANE EYRE** 



Jane Eyre was first published in 1847 and the novel is set in Northern England in the early decades of the nineteenth century. At the time women were seen as second class citizens with few rights, opportunities or ways of supporting themselves. They were expected to marry as well and obey their husbands. For middle class women such as Jane, the only option was to teach or become a governess, which offered them a small degree of independence and security outside of marriage.

Jane Eyre is set in the north of England in the first half of the nineteenth century. During this period, society was undergoing a slow but significant change and Charlotte Bronte touches on three areas of social concern: education, women's employment and marriage. Women in that era were allowed to study, work and marry whoever they wanted, which was completely different from the eighteenth century when women were not allowed to study, work and marry whoever they wanted.






# COVID-19: MALAYSIANS HAVE HIGH SELF-CONTROL

ONLINE SURVEY BY MOH ON NEW NORMAL PRACTICES (NOV 25 - 30, 2020)

#### SURVEY RESULTS:

- 1. Respondents who practised self-discipline for COVID-19 prevention:
  - Wearing face mask (93.3%)
  - Ensuring physical distancing (89.6 %)
  - Washing hands with soap & water / sanitiser (89.7%)



- 2. Respondents who dared to reprimand family members over:
  - Wearing a face mask (93.8%)
  - Physical distancing (90.1 %)
  - Washing hands with soap & water / sanitiser (90.8%)



- 3. Respondents who dared to reprimand a friend over:
  - Wearing a face mask (82.2%)
  - Physical distancing (79.4 %)
  - Washing hands with soap & water / sanitiser (79.2%)



- 4. Respondents who dared to reprimand other individuals over:
  - Wearing a face mask (57.3%)
  - Physical distancing (59.6 %)
  - Washing hands with soap & water / sanitiser (56.7%)
