

Learn from The First Wave




RAINBOW WRITING






In their Malay lessons, the students developed their language skills with a focus on the new norms and demonstrated some action to prevent Covid -19 and stay safe.







United We Stand







YEAR 5 MATHS

Sensational Science

This week we conducted an experiment that showed us the process where acid mixed with a metal will result in salt and hydrogen.

We did 3 experiments in total for this week: hydrochloric acid added with zinc; sulphuric acid with zinc, and finally sulphuric acid with copper oxide.

This experiment showed us the 3 main results of acid mixed with metal, and I can now remember the formula for them more easily.


Year 9 Global Connections




