

Y1 IPC EXIT POINT








































BrainWaves





Memorable Learning



Year 2 students have been learning about estimating and counting. The students were asked to estimate and count various items from their respective houses. Students had a fun time doing this activity with their parents and siblings.





Reflections on Flipgrid learning






Articulate Answers















Year 9 Global Connections



The next morning they finally discovered the truth. The alarm sounded, but by then Shiratori was long gone, but this was only the beginning...


Fireball

Able to be happy or successful again after something difficult or bad has happened*


Secondary word of the week:


