


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Explorers and Adventurers




Question Time

Thinking Spaces




As we return to online teaching, Year 5 is back on track with Google Meets and doing group work.


Environment for Learning

The IPC topic, Weather and Climate will take students across the globe exploring various environmental conditions. It opens with a challenge for students to plan a rescue mission to Antartica. Students are challenged to develop a rescue plan and strategies for survival in extreme conditions which they may face in Antarctica. In the unit, students produce maps, plan their journey, estimate the cost and how long it will take to get there.


Students also discuss the definition of weather and climate and understand the differences between them.

What is Jigsaw?

Jigsaw is a cooperative learning strategy that enables each student of a "home" group to specialize in one aspect of a topic. Students meet with members from other groups who are assigned the same aspect, and after mastering the material, return to the "home" group and teach the material to their group members. With this strategy, each student in the "home" group serves as a piece of the topic's puzzle and when they work together as a whole, they create the complete jigsaw puzzle.

The Power and Standby signs

Standby mode helps save power when your computer or electronic devices are not in use, completely without power when turned off. The standby mode is usually indicated by a solid yellow light or flashing on the body of the device.

> The power on symbol (line), which appears on the button or at one end of the toggle switch indicates that the control is putting the equipment into a full power state.



a power-off symbol (circle) on a button or switch, indicating that using the control will out power to the device.



low power status. The switch does not completely disconnect the device from its power supply. This may appear on the toggle switch opposite the power-on symbol.




a power on-off symbol (line in a circle), used on a button that switches the device between its full on and off state.







In the city the cars zooms the trains whoosh the motorcycles roar




